What do you think of when you hear the term 'old-time calypso'? Something from the early 1960s, perhaps, or even the 50s? Or does your mind go back past Sparrow and Kitchener to the likes of Roaring Lion and Atilla the Hun?

Well, if the 1930s aren't distant enough, you could always try some 100-year-old dance tracks on a CD appropriately called *Calypso Dawn*: 1912. That's right, these songs were recorded half a century before Trinidad gained independence, in the year the Titanic met that iceberg. This is not so much history as archaeology, and we can only marvel at the dedication of those who unearthed these treasures and painstakingly prepared them for 21st-century ears.

The CD has been out for a couple of years but only came to SN's notice recently. The 21 songs were recorded during a visit to the USA by a Trinidadian band led by George Baillie (or Bailey), aka Lovey, of Charlotte Street, Port-of Spain. All are instrumentals and described as either 'vals' (waltz) or 'paseo'. The paseo style is closest to what we would recognise as 'traditional' calypso, but some are reminiscent of Martinican biguine.

There are two remarkable features of this compilation. The first is the sound quality of these antique recordings, which is far cleaner and richer than the scratchy, hissy sound normally associated with old 78rpm records. Nevertheless, the crude equipment of the era was limited in terms of sound frequency range, and some instruments did not record as well as others, so the listener should make some allowances.
